Why is good attendance important:

The UN convention on the rights of the child number 28 states: 'You have the right to education'

Evidence suggest that pupils who attend school more regularly achieve better outcomes in their GCSEs

Missing out on education, especially in the first few years can impact on the childs ability to make and maintain friendships.

Ensuring good attendance and punctuality is a characteristic that future employers will expect - better to get habits right now.

Arriving late at school can be disruptive for the class and teachers - it can also create unnecessary anxiety in the child.

If regular attendance patterns are not established, research has indicated that some young people who regularly miss school for no good reason may be drawn into anti-social behaviour or crime.

Pupils may miss out on special events and experiences that might not be repeated again.
